#### **Facts and Stats**

40% of Teen Center families make less than \$30,000





Number of meals served annually. **34% Of Teen Center families** have income below the poverty

line. The warm meal our students receive daily is just one additional way we try to lessen the burden on parents.

There is an adult in my after school program who cared about me. Research shows that **89% Of** those mentored go on to mentor others.



On a typical day, **58 Students** attend Teen Center.

This was a 66% increase compared to the 2018-2019 school year. 40% of our enrollment was from incoming freshman.

88% of the 2020 seniors are now **enrolled** in post-secondary education.
