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We promote opportunity for students through intentional after school programming that provides education, exposure, and mentorship.

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## Though there were moments that our physical space wasn't filled with students this year, our program never stopped.

Our incredible staff anticipated and planned for all possible scenarios. Thus, when OPS went fully remote, we were able to pivot and adapt within days. Intentional and meaningful programming was provided both virtually and on demand. We got very acquainted with Zoom, delivered materials to student's doorsteps, provided increased emergency assistance and held more Family Nights than any other year. Students were excitedly requesting Driver's Education and were able to squeeze that in during the Spring. Additionally, many of our students were requesting additional mental health services and opportunities to connect during this time of quarantine. We were able to offer Talk About It Tuesdays for students to decompress and connect with their peers and staff, as well as a pilot program of Expressive Arts therapy through collaboration with Project Harmony. With close partnerships with OPS and Collective for Youth, we were confident and ready when it was time to return in person. Through the caution and anxiety, it was incredible to see our students again. As we look to the 2021-2022 school year, we prepare for year of health, creativity and innovation. Thank you for walking alongside us during this difficult year.
