





## **Becky Hand**

Mom

I grew up in a Mexican family where social justice and education were top priority. As a grandchild of immigrants and a daughter of a fierce advocate and pioneer in the Head Start world, my foundation for life was solid - but with a single parent in college and working full time, I found freedom and fell through the cracks. My life quickly filled with gang life and drugs. Life broke me many times but people continued to see the potential, give me chances and invest in me. Fast forward 20 years, I moved myself to Omaha with three kids and was working in child care at St. Luke. I had heard there was a Teen Center downstairs and desperately worked to get my first born into Burke. In 2014, he enrolled and our family continued to seek stability in our new home.

At one point, I couldn't afford the calculator my son needed for his advanced math class. I requested to meet with Abbey and she led me to the back room and handed me one. While that may have been a simple act, that moment changed everything for me and my relationship with the program.

The Teen Center allowed a space for tears, conversations, laughter and dreams. Not just about my kids, but my goals, failures and dreams. As a parent, they have always allowed me the time, grace and love to be me.

At the end of the day, I see myself in many of the Teen Center students. There is so much power in making students feel safe, seen and loved.

This year, I completed my term on the Teen Center Board of Directors, Kyla began working at the Teen Center and my youngest became the fourth and last to enroll in the Teen Center.

# **Kyla Channita**

#### **Daughter**

I am the third of four from my family to come through the Teen Center. I rode the wave of my two overachieving brothers - connecting with their friends and following in their footsteps. I felt like I was connected to the Teen Center because they were connected, but I never really established my own bond to the program. By my senior year, I had experienced some high-level traumas and adapted to the 'nothing really matters' mentality. I had seen others reach out to the Teen Center for help but I felt I couldn't.

I went to college because it was the natural next step. Again, going through the motions, not much had changed. My mental health remained in distress, but I moved forward. I rotated between study hard and party hard. By



the end of my third year, I came to realize something had to give. Lincoln and college weren't my jam at this moment and I needed to do some damage control.

As I started to contemplate this transition, my mom sent me a job opening at the Teen Center. My instant thoughts were, "No way, they wouldn't want me, I failed in their program, they don't remember me," etc. Nervous as ever, I showed up to my interview in a newly purchased, hopefully professional-enough outfit. Shoot - I got the job and imposter syndrome immediately set in.

What I learned was there was no keeping track. They loved me for exactly who I was and where I was at and despite my internal thoughts, I had something to offer. I joined a team that was transparent, loving and inclusive. This job changed my life. I belong and have a purpose. I strive to share my wins and losses and help students connect to the program in a deep way. I just finished my first year as a Program Assistant and I couldn't imagine being anywhere else.


