STAFF DEVELOPMENT Fostering a Culture of Continuous Learning

Our Assistant Director of Operations and Finance attended the Every Hour Counts Conference in Minneapolis with other after-school leaders from Omaha. There, she was able to learn more about policies and legislation affecting after-school activities, build connections with like-minded individuals working in the afterschool community, and gather numerous resources for our staff and students to utilize. A highlight was hearing from Minnesota's Attorney General, Keith Ellison, speak on his passion for youth, how he leads his office with empathy and compassion for all residents, and his continued work to ensure all rights are protected.

The leaders participated in the TEAMS Cohort Leadership training, spending 10 days with 19 other leaders at Lied Lodge in Nebraska City. The curriculum was expansive and critical, including personal assessment and development, management of conflict and crisis, development strategies, and industry trends. The depth of relationships, community and accountability amongst the directors was profound.

Return to Learn (RTL) was implemented upon the Teen Center's move into Burke High School. All Teen Center members are eligible to use RTL as needed throughout their school day. Students may visit for a variety of reasons, from accessing period products to seeking de-escalation support during conflict.



New Paths for Seniors: Early Release Programming

Students are eligible for early-release during their senior year.

The Teen Center created specific curriculum and added programming to address those students and their schedule. Upon completion of their school day, at either 11 a.m. or 1 p.m., seniors are able to access academic assistance, post-secondary preparation, community service opportunities, and social-emotional programming.






Celebrating the Class of 2025: Military to Middlebury

Tara's Story: A Journey That Comes Full Circle

After high school, you never truly know where life will take you or how relationships will evolve. Life often sends us in different directions, and for a while, that was true for me. I got married and became a mother at a young age, and throughout all of life's changes, the Teen Center remained a constant presence and support.

Abbey and I lost touch after my 2010 graduation from Burke High School, but life brought us back together in the most unexpected way—through a Lamaze class. As fate would have it, we gave birth to our firstborn sons on the same day, at the same hospital. From that moment, our bond was rekindled, and we picked up right where we left off. Abbey reminded me that, no matter where life took us, the Teen Center would always be home—a place I could return to without hesitation.

The Teen Center has stood by me through my proudest achievements and my most challenging times. As a young mother of two, one of whom is on the autism spectrum, I often stayed home, navigating feelings of isolation and financial stress. My twenties were filled with moments when I felt like I was barely keeping up—raising children, managing a household, and trying to finish school.

As an alumni, I've always been incredibly grateful for the continued support the Teen Center offers. From alumni events and family outings to essential resources like food pantries and school supplies, the Teen Center has remained a lifeline for me and my children.

Over time, I've had the opportunity to give back by teaching crafting classes through my small business and sharing my journey with fellow alumni. Reflecting on the path I've taken, I'm overwhelmed with gratitude. The Teen Center has truly been with me every step of the way, and words can't fully express what that support has meant to me and my family.

I remember meeting Tara for the first time—she was chopping it up with everyone on the bleachers at the Teen Center. Her bubbly spirit matched her contagious, bright smile, and she was often accompanied by an older brother or younger sister in tow. As years progressed, I saw less of Tara as she spent her upperclassmen years couch-surfing and navigating young adulthood on her own.

Flash forward to 2011, my husband and I were expecting our first baby. We signed up for the Parenthood 101 class. As we walked into the crowded room, I heard a sweet sing-song voice: "Hey Miss Abbey." Bellies almost touching, we introduced our husbands and spoke of the nerves and joy that come with motherhood.

July 2012—it's time! We headed to the hospital to welcome our firstborn. Doing labor laps in the hall, I hear that sweet voice again: "Hey Miss Abbey." Our boys were born hours apart.

Our bond was sealed forever. We became chosen family.

The things we have shared over the years are immense. We have done a lot of life together!

Tara served as the 2024 Alumni Speaker at the Teen Center Graduation Party. There, she shared her advice—one piece being: "The Teen Center will always be home. Come visit often. Reach out. Celebrate your wins. When low, someone will be there to wipe your tears and give hugs. There is love here. There is family here."

During the 2024–2025 school year, the **Teen Center** supported 178 Burke High School students.

As a Title I designated school, Burke has a significant percentage of students who need extra help—10% need additional support during the day, and 5% need out-ofschool support like food or housing assistance.

needs head-on, ensuring students don't just stay in school but feel seen, supported, and equipped to succeed.

In-school supports meet students where they are—whether they need a quiet place to work, help regulating emotions, or access to basic needs like meal bags and period products.


This year, Teen Center supported 627 student visits:


202 Return to Learn sessions (helping students manage stress, conflict, and crisis moments)

150 alternative workspace visits, averaging 40 minutes each

Dozens more visits for lunch, "flybys," testtaking support, and basic needs

By offering a safe place to regroup and feel heard, the Teen Center helps students stay in class, avoid risky behaviors, and build resilience.

Programs spanned Health & Wellness, Arts & Culture, tutoring, homework help, and clubs.



Personalized support for graduation and beyond

The 2025 class included 24 graduates:







Together, seniors spent over hours with Teen Center staff on schoolwork, college and job applications, scholarships, and capstone projects.

And it paid off:

100% were eligible to graduate on time

94% felt ready for their next step

81% had three or more trusted adults at the Teen Center

All supported by a dedicated team of just four full-time staff.







THIS is Lifelong Connection

Support that continues long after graduation

This year, Teen Center had **159 meaningful contacts with alumni**, from check-ins to stability supports and celebrations.

Engagement rose during:

August: Back-to-School

October-December:
Holiday Assistance Program

Even better, alumni gave back: donating **70 volunteer hours** through Holiday Assistance, alumni-led programming, advice panels for younger students, career mentoring, and the Legacy Gala.

COMMUNITY ENCACEMENT







During the 2024-25 school year, the Teen Center distributed:

- 300 period product kits
- 44 pairs of period underwear
- 23,710 period products

These products covered 830 periods and created 4,152 worry-free days.

Beyond the Teen Center, period products are located in all women's restrooms, the nurse's office, and three teachers' classrooms.

Thank you to our volunteers—Shauna Daly and Eleanor Hollowell—for consistent and compassionate delivery of products to the Teen Center.

An interactive Game of Life experience gave 60 students real-life exposure to financial literacy and planning, thanks to the employees at BMO.

Students drew a career, then maneuvered through stations, making life decisions based on their financial situation. The stations ranged from the IRS to child care.









Skatefest Omaha remains a popular program option for students to stay active and build confidence. New this year, students were challenged with proficiency cards, where they could try, practice, and master three levels of tricks.










Downtown Day included an engaging visit to the Kiewit Luminarium, followed by lunch and exploration of The RiverFront park.


